# A Note from Rev. Becky Sunday

You would think that, having spent my entire life in Ohio, I would be used to cold winters by now. Yet it seems that I am never quite ready for this coldest season of the year. After a particularly mild December, I find myself now bracing for the worst.

My husband could tell you that I rarely sit at home in the evenings without a blanket over me to keep me warm. This habit reminds me of my grandmother. Growing up, I remember always seeing her with a blanket on her lap. She told me that she had suffered from diphtheria when she was a teenager and that, after her illness, she never again felt completely warm. I remember thinking how horrible that must be—to never be quite warm enough—to never be truly comfortable.



I have a special afghan at home that I like to wrap up in sometimes. It was crocheted by my sister as a gift for my high school graduation. I love it because it is beautiful and warm, but mostly because she made it for me. I love that it is not perfect, but was given in perfect love. I took that afghan with me to college and to graduate school. Whenever I was feeling lost or alone, I could wrap myself up in that wonderful gift and remember that I was loved.

It strikes me that too many people in our world do not have such a gift. Too many people, when faced with the difficult realities of illness, hardship, or loneliness are left feeling empty and lost. Like my grandmother, they are never quite warm enough—never completely comforted. How many people in our own lives might be feeling that way now? How many people need to hear words of love and comfort? What can we do to help bring them healing and peace?

A few months ago, one of our members asked me if I had seen any of the lap robes the Women's Guild had made some years ago to give to those among us who might need them. It took me awhile, but I finally found them tucked away in a seldom-accessed closet. These lap robes are beautiful, and it struck me that they certainly do not belong hidden in a remote corner of our church building. If you have been in the church library lately, you know that they are currently displayed on a newly installed quilt ladder. If you haven't seen them, go and look sometime.

Better yet, take one with you and give it to someone you know who might need to feel a little extra warmth this winter—someone who needs some healing, comfort, or encouragement. After all, these gifts were made with love and meant to be given. In the end they don't belong displayed on a quilt rack either, but on the shoulders and laps of those who need them. Call the gifts lap robes or prayer shawls or whatever you want, but give them with love so that those who receive them can wrap up and feel the warmth of the love of God and of St. Paul UCC surrounding them. No one is alone.

# New Year Greetings from the Church Mice...

Many thanks to church members who agreed to be greeters during the month of December. It was a blessing to have someone available to engage visitors in conversation, help them find a place to sit, introduce them to those nearby. It was amazing to find members from the early service so eager to volunteer. Second service church members seemed a bit more shy about accepting an assignment. Hopefully, as we all become more used to the idea, whole families will choose to take on a greeter assignment. Let's make sure everyone who comes through our doors gets the message, "You are welcome here."

## Why be a greeter? What do you get out of it?

- ◆ Gives you a happy feeling the rest of the day.
- ◆ You get to surprise somebody with a nice little gift.
- ◆ Gives you a chance to brush up on your conversation skills.
- ◆ Gives you a chance to finally make the connection with that name and face of the person you usually avoid because you are afraid you'll get it wrong.
- ◆ Gives shy people a reason to walk up to people and start talking.

## Why be a greeter? What does it accomplish?

- ◆ Gives visitors someone to talk with, ask questions of, a familiar face for repeat visitors.
- ◆ Helps visitors to not feel like intruders.
- ◆ Helps visitors avoid sitting in some member's 'favorite' seat.
- ◆ In good weather, even bad weather, someone is watching out for visitors, to open the door, help on the stairs, help with coats.
- ◆ Just might help visitors feel like St. Paul UCC would be a good "Church Home".
- ◆ Un-noticed might make visitors feel unwelcome and un-likely to return.
- ◆ Helps members who aren't often in church to feel welcome and that somebody cares when they do come. (See statement directly above.)

## Who can be a greeter?

- ◆ Anyone willing to volunteer their time one Sunday for about half an hour before the second church service, or twenty minutes before first service.

- ◆ Any age person can do it, but preferably old enough to ambulate, talk and hold a conversation. (Wheelchairs, walkers and canes definitely qualify.)

## How many people need to be greeters on a Sunday?

- ◆ One at each of the doors to the sanctuary would be ideal. At first service one greeter may be enough.
- ◆ If every member of our congregation volunteered for just one Sunday, we would have all the greeters we need.

## I HATE name tags, do I have to wear one?

- ◆ Your choice, but a visitor might wonder why they are being accosted instead of just slipping in so they can sit un-noticed in a corner. Un-noticed might lead to a feeling of un-welcome and un-likely to return. (Did you see that before somewhere?)
- ◆ The visitor might just like to be able to connect a name and face next time they come. Hearing you say it and reading it too increases the chance they will remember your name.

**Try being a greeter just once. You might find it is habit-forming, even addictive!**

## 2012 LENTEN STUDY

Pastor Becky will be leading a Lenten study entitled *Faithfully Facing Dying: A Lenten Study Guide on Critical Issues and Decisions Surrounding Dying and Death*. The study will convene at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday evenings during Lent (**February 23 through March 29**). This six-week study will cover topics ranging from advance directives, hospice, and palliative care to physician aid in dying/physician-assisted suicide. The study will use Psalm 139 as a scriptural backdrop and will discuss these important issues from a theological perspective. There is no cost for the study, but please sign up in the breezeway by February 19th so that adequate materials are available.

## Are You Christ?

Sometimes we need to think if by watching us, others would know if we are Christians. When Lindsay, my oldest daughter, was in China this past spring she found that the churches there are run by the government. If you are not following their ways, of their church, it is against the law. She was asked if she was a Christian by some of her Chinese friends and then she was invited to their Bible study. To meet though, they met in secret.

Evan Hall from Wisconsin writes about a pen pal he had from Japan where she didn't have any idea who or what Christians are like:

*"A few years ago, I had a pen pal from Japan. Her name was Chiaki. I enjoyed learning from her about Japanese culture and about the similarities and differences in our lives.*

*In one of her letters, Chiaki asked, "Are you Christ?" I was stunned until I realized that she was asking me if I were a Christian. Other than one of her relatives, she didn't know any Christians except those who met at the train station to pray. That came as no surprise since less than one percent of the Japanese people are Christian. Most are either Buddhist or Shinto. Though Chiaki attends worship twice a month, the average Japanese goes to a shrine or a temple only for annual events and rituals.*

*I told Chiaki about my life as a Christian, and I hope that I have been a good example of a faithful Christian for her. St. Paul tells us that in order to connect with people of other faiths, he had to fit in with them, while remaining faithful to the gospel. Then as people began to accept him, they were more likely to listen to him. As Christians, we will do well to follow his example as we try to share Christ with others."*

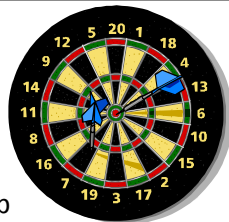

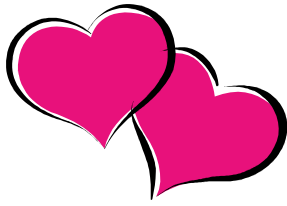

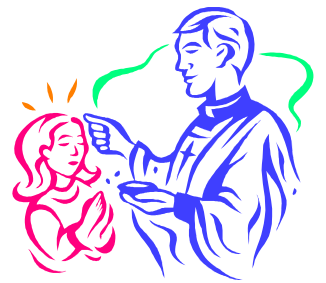
