Trick or Treat

Times have changed! When was the last time you heard that? "When I was a boy..." we called it beggars night. We had a little poem that went along with the event:

*Tonight is beggar's night,
We've come to get a bite.
If you don't give us a bite,
We'll see you tomorrow night!*

I can't recall that we ever followed through on our threat; perhaps because there was no reason to do so.

In the passing of time the treats we received back then really were treats. Candy was not all that plentiful seventy years ago. Sometimes the persons we called on would invite us into their home for a cup of hot chocolate. They would then pump us as to who we really were. "Oh your dad or mom is so-and-so?" Perhaps this was insurance should something really happen tomorrow night.

Away back then we had no fear of razor blades hidden in the candy, or drugs, or poison. We beggars traveled in groups with no parent driving us from neighborhood to neighborhood. Perhaps an older brother or sister would be with us just to protect the little beggars from being picked on by bigger beggars.

Some beggars were less optimistic than others. I was one of the optimistic ones. My treat bag was a large onion sack; it could hold lots of treats. When the bag got full we would call it a night and go home.

But the innocents of childhood too soon fade away. We get older and come to realize there really are the poor and the hungry in the world. Some beg on the street corners and live in cardboard box shelters. All their earthly belongings are kept in a stolen grocery cart. We look the other way as we pass them on the street. We ask ourselves, "Are they really poor,

or just too lazy to work? If they are really hungry how can they afford to buy cigarettes?"

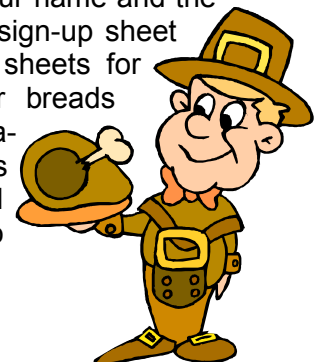

A Note from Rev. Becky Sunday

HOLIDAY TIME!

Can you believe that it is already time to be gearing up for the holidays? In just a few weeks we will be filling our tummies with turkey and stuffing. Then, before you know it, we'll be trimming trees and singing carols. The next two months will be full of holiday preparations. Sometimes, when I see how our society has commercialized the holidays, I wonder if we really know what they are all about.

The word "holidays" literally means "holy days." The use of this word signifies that we consider certain days throughout the year to hold sacred meaning. Thanksgiving is one of those days. Indeed, Thanksgiving celebrations are often some of the most memorable among our families. Even though Thanksgiving is a national observance rather than a liturgical or ecclesiastical one, we still call it a holiday. The suggestion that Thanksgiving is a "holy day" indicates that it is not all about Pilgrims and Native Americans, but that there is a sacred element as well.

At Thanksgiving, people all over the United States gather in the act of giving thanks to God—a sacred act that we neglect too often throughout the rest of the year. William Temple, former Archbishop of Canterbury once wrote, *"It is probable that in most of us the spiritual life is impoverished and stunted because we give so little place to gratitude. It is more important to thank God for blessings received than to pray for them beforehand. For that forward-looking prayer, though right as an expression of dependence upon God, is still self-centered in part, at least, of its interest; there is something we hope to gain by our prayer. But the backward-looking act of thanksgiving is quite free from this. In itself it is quite selfless. Thus it is akin to love. All our love to God is in response to [God's] love for us; it never starts on our side. 'We love, because [God] first loved us' (1 John 4:19)."*

Before the month is out, we will find ourselves in Advent, the season of preparation before Christmas. Without question, Christmas is the most widely celebrated holiday in the world. This holy day finds its origin in the Christian faith, and as Christ's followers we rejoice in the coming of the seasons of Advent and Christmas. These are days that remind us of God's great love for us, and for all humankind, that compelled God to become a human being in the person of Jesus Christ, to live among us, to preach, teach, and heal, and ultimately to endure great pain and suffering so that we might have fuller lives in him.

In light of this great gift, Christian communities consider Christmas Day to be one of the most important days of the year. The apostle Paul talked about "important" days in his letter to the Romans, saying: *"Some judge one day to be better than another, while others judge all days to be alike. Let all be fully convinced in their own minds. Those who observe the day, observe it in honor of the Lord"* (Romans 14:5-6a).

However you and your family chose to celebrate in the coming weeks, do it in honor of the Lord. I pray that you all enjoy this season of "holy days."

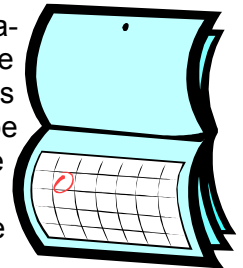

- ◆ Meeting was called to order by President Short @ 6:00 and Dr. Joe lead the group in prayer.
- ◆ Secretary's minutes were read and approved.
- ◆ Two "Thank-you" notes were received and read.
- ◆ Treasurer's report was given with a \$1,672.29 credit. Treasurer's report was accepted.

Trustee Report:

- ◆ The parking lot resurfacing has been postponed until the spring. Our price has been guaranteed.
- ◆ Weed eater was worked on and the new floor scrubber is here and working great.

Elder Report:

- ◆ Linda is working on the revised job description for the Financial Secretary being vacated by Hannah at the end of January 2012.

Deacon Report:

- ◆ 1st Faith Promise letters will be stuffed and mailed October 13th.

Pastors' Reports:

- ◆ Joe's & Becky's reports were given to the council.

Old Business:

- ◆ Living Endowment Board : Motion to approve Rollie Wellington to replace Leland Stroh was made and accepted.
- ◆ Shirley Baughman is retiring as the accompanist for the Cherub Choir.

New Business:

- ◆ President Mark suggested purchasing robes for Acolytes. Council discussion followed. Some members were concerned about the necessity of the robes. Mark asked for permission to ask for donations on the new robes. The robes will be approximately \$100 each. Possibly need to purchase 8 robes.
- ◆ Prospective new members will be accepted during 10:15 worship on October 30th.
- ◆ Establishment of a Pastoral Relations committee for Rev. Becky needs to be developed.
- ◆ New council members will be needed to fill the vacating spots.

Adjournment of the meeting and a reminder the next meeting in Monday November 14th 2011 at 6:00 pm. All members of the congregation are welcome.

Dan Bennett has been researching and writing a detailed history of the church. This history traces the life of the church from its beginnings to the present. Also included are short biographies of all of the pastors and many of the interim pastors, all baptisms, marriages, and funerals performed. Eventually it will include all confirmations, church staff and all council members that can be found.

Presently there are two copies with one located in the church office. We are trying to determine if would there be enough interest in the members to justify printing copies so more people could have a copy. The book would be printed in notebook fashion so that it could be updated annually. The cost of the book would greatly depend

upon the number printed. Roughly it would cost \$25-\$30 for the history and pastor biographies (approximately 94-96 pages). The complete book would be somewhere around \$110-\$130 and contain approximately 550-600 pages. Both layouts would have color pictures. The history will eventually be placed on the church's website.

And, this even happens to the most church going person. Let's say a committee is formed in church that you wanted to be a part of but your name wasn't listed in the bulletin.

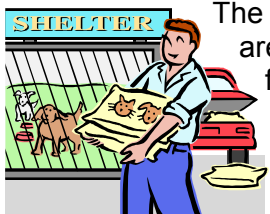

“My Church”

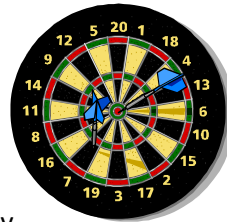

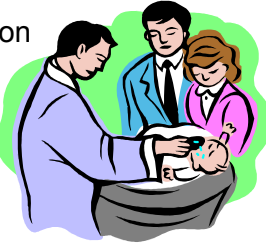

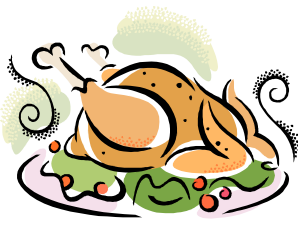


Financial Secretary
